TPE ANNUAL MEETING and PICNIC

The Southwest Chapter of The Prairie Enthusiasts will host the summer picnic and annual meeting for 1999. The event is scheduled for Saturday, July 17 at Nelson Dewey State Park, just north of Cassville on Grant County Hwy. V V. We will meet at the shelter house on top of the bluff at 12 noon for a picnic meal. A state park vehicle admission sticker is required. The annual meeting and election of officers will follow the meal at approximately 1:30pm. The Southwest Chapter will provide the meat and accompaniments. Please bring a dish to pass, your tableware, and beverage of choice. We have reserved the shelter house so that rain or shine, the annual meeting will take place. Nelson Dewey Park has a small but excellent dry prairie that is worth a visit. There are trails you can hike and camp sites are available. It is not a highly used state park so there are usually sites available, even at short notice. SEE YOU THERE!

SOUTHEAST WISCONSIN CHAPTER FORMING

On March 27, a group met at the West Bend Mutual Insurance Company's headquarters to discuss formation of a new TPE chapter. There is a keen interest in starting a local TPE chapter so that southeast Wisconsin TPE members will be able to experience the advantages enjoyed by members in other chapters: learning about prairie and savanna ecosystems through presentations and field trips; learning how to plant prairies; participating in management activities; developing

partnerships with schools, parks, and conservation agencies, and with other conservation organizations; and, networking with other local enthusiasts.

The proposed chapter will include Dodge, Fond du Lac, Jefferson, Kenosha, Milwaukee, Ozaukee, Racine, Sheboygan, Walworth, Washington and Waukesha counties. Since the chapter area is geographically large and has an extensive population base, it is likely to evolve into two chapters in the future.

At this time the primary focus will be the development of the local membership base. New TPE member Jennifer Narang helped start the process by arranging a TPE booth at four Milwaukee area Earth Day events. Since then, TPE brochures have been distributed at southeast Wisconsin nature centers, the Horicon Marsh National Wildlife Refuge and the Ice Age Trail headquarters at Dundee. Plans are also in the works to host an informational/educational event early in the fall.

Of course, the absolute number of new members is not nearly as important as the recruitment of a core group of committed individuals willing to donate some time to help get the new chapter up and running! If you are willing to help, please call Jim Dworshack at 414-628-4656.

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The Prairie Enthusiasts is a grass roots organization of volunteers which is solely committed to the protection, management, and restoration of native prairies and savannas in the Upper Midwest. To date, The Prairie Enthusiasts has protected over 1,000 acres that harbor at least 5 state or federally protected species requisitions, easements, and management agreements. The Prairie Enthusiasts has a stewardship program which provides active management to ensure the ongoing health of protected sites.

The Prairie Enthusiasts is actively involved in planting prairie on its properties and on other conservation lands and has assisted both public agencies and private groups in these efforts. Thus far, more than 150 acres have been planted with seeds of prairie plants from local sources.

In addition, The Prairie Enthusiasts develop educational materials and provide presentations on prairie and savanna ecology, conservation, and management for both children and adults.

The Prairie Enthusiasts was incorporated in Wisconsin in 1987 as a private nonprofit, tax exempt corporation under section 501(c)3 of the Internal Revenue Code. Donations are tax-deductible.

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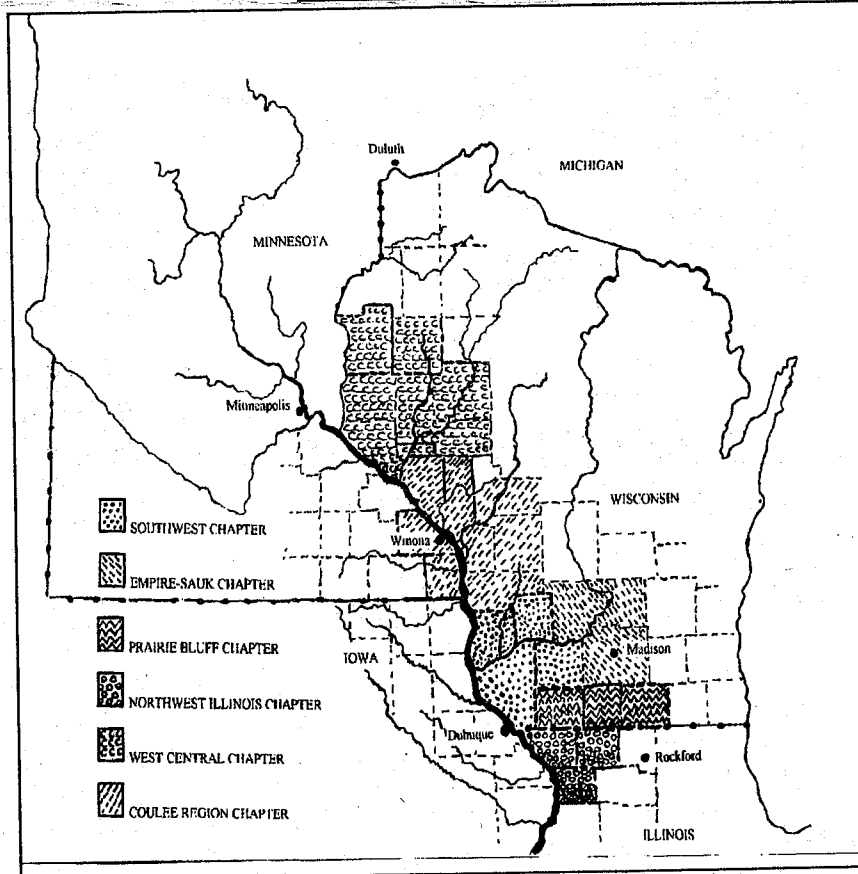
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TPE CHAPTER AREAS

It was an extremely satisfying trip for me due to the fact that The Prairie Enthusiasts was selected to receive an award from the Society for Conservation Biology for its outstanding contributions to preserving Wisconsin's biological diversity.

I felt kind of selfish, thinking I was the only TPE member there and the award was actually due to the efforts of many, many enthusiasts throughout the entire organization. Unfortunately, I had little opportunity to let others know about this recognition prior to the event. I hope that you will pause and reflect about this recognition, for it tells us some important things. LANDOWNER GRASSLAND RESTORATION FIELD DAY SEPTEMBER 11, 1999

Governor Nelson State Park Restorations are Changing!

In the past few months, Governor Nelson State Park has been undergoing a number of facility development projects. These new developments may be affecting the past and future prairie and savanna restorations. As those who have helped establish the restorations in the past, you should be aware of the changes.

Since 1991, the Department of Natural Resources, The Prairie Enthusiasts, Madison Audubon Society, and area schools have restored over 160 acres of native ecosystems at the park. Hundreds of volunteers and park staff have worked thousands of hours restoring and maintaining prairie, savanna, woodland, and sedge meadow communities....some of the most rare ecosystems in the state. These restoration efforts have transformed areas into colorful glimpses of the pre-settlement landscape with the re-introduction of over 200 species of native grasses and forbs. Rare grassland and savanna birds,

such as, bobolinks, grasshopper sparrows, and orchard orioles have benefited from your efforts.

Until recently, the 380-acre "extensive use area" of the park has remained relatively undeveloped. As in many state parks, this area serves as the more natural part of the park where visitors can experience many aspects of nature. This area contains the restored ecosystems, abandoned fields/pastures, and 4.5 miles of hiking/ski trails. The plan is to continue to restore the remaining 220 acres of this area to native ecosystems as well. However, the emphasis appears to be changing to developing more facilities in this area of the park. Three additional miles of trails were added to the original 4.5 miles during November of 1998. Two miles of the new trails were put in by mowing down prairie restorations that you helped plant since 1988.

These additional trails have the potential to cause further fragmentation of the open grassland complex by increasing contact of grassland birds with humans and their pets. Park staff are considering adding more trails in the future. Other possible considerations are the development of a campground and a fenced dog run area.

Governor Nelson has the potential of becoming a "showcase" prairie/savanna park. Such a park can contain a recreational beach, boat launch, and picnic area that is complemented by a relatively undeveloped landscape of widely spaced trails and natural ecosystems. Such a park will contrast surrounding residential development with the natural attributes of a landscape-scale native ecosystem....something that an over-developed "city-type" park cannot do. The same natural attributes that distinguish a state park from other types of parks draw most people to the notion of visiting it in the first place.

As people who have helped to restore those native ecosystems in the park, it is important that you become aware of the changes taking place. Please visit the park for yourself to see the changes, then give your input to Governor Nelson State Park and Department of Natural Resources staff.

The books are closed for 1998, and our tax statements to the state and federal government are completed for another year. I have kept the books now for a number of years, and it is with quiet satisfaction that I look back on past years and see the truly amazing growth of this organization. We are still fairly small when you compare us with other regional environmental organizations, and yet the growth in both people and financial stability has been tremendous. We have a membership base of 735 people, primarily in the Upper Midwest. We send out 765 newsletters and to date have protected over 1,000 acres of prairie and oak savanna. Our educational efforts continue to expand and our name is now widely recognized as a viable organization in Wisconsin and surrounding states. We still run the organization on a completely volunteer basis, and I rely a great deal on the chapter treasurers and membership coordinators to help me keep the books in order. They all do a fine job and I want to take this opportunity to thank them for their patience and attention to detail.

EMPIRE-SAUK CHAPTER

Empire-Sauk Annual Meeting and Picnic.

The chapter's annual meeting, will take place on Monday, July 12, at 6:00 p.m. at Gov. Nelson State Park. We will meet at the main picnic (beach area) shelter for a potluck meal followed by a brief annual meeting and then a tour of the 160-acre restoration. The meeting will include nominations and voting on the positions of President and Secretary for the Empire-Sauk Chapter. Bring a dish to pass and your own plate, beverage, and utensils. (Gov. Nelson State Park is located 2 miles east of Middleton on Co. Hwy. M. A state park admission sticker is required for vehicles.)

The restoration of native plant communities at the park has been underway since 1988. To date, over 160 acres of dry to wet prairies, oak savanna, oak woodland, and sedge meadow have been restored. Over 200 species of native plants are present in the mixture of prairies and savannas. This is a great opportunity for all members to tour the restorations in full bloom and to picnic with your fellow chapter members.

Nominations Sought. Nominations are being sought for chapter President and Secretary (each is a two-year term). Nominations and elections will be made by the general membership at the annual meeting on July 12th.

Any Ideas for Field Trips? In an effort to provide more opportunities for our membership to experience, enjoy, and learn about prairies and oak savannas, the Empire-Sauk Chapter is trying to provide a rich assortment of field trips (see calendar of events). If you are interested in leading field trips or you have ideas on sites to visit or have suggestions of people to lead field trips, please contact our chapter's trip coordinator, Mark Martin at (608) 635-4160. The sites can be local, statewide, or out-of-state. The trips can be 2 hours on a weekday evening, half or a full weekend day, or a full weekend with over night arrangements. We are now planning for spring/summer 2000.

An Outstanding Burn Season for Empire-Sauk Chapter. Burn season this spring got off to a quick start in mid-March due to a warm and dry spell. A few cool and wet periods after this slowed

things down a little, but enough dry days came along in between for nearly all planned burns to be accomplished by May 1. As in the past, the chapter was organized into two work units. One led by Jeb Barzen worked in Sauk County and along the lower Wisconsin River. The other led by Rich Henderson and Paul West worked mostly in Dane County. In all, 28 sites totaling 445 acres were burned. Approximately 80 people volunteered to help with organizing and conducting the burns. About 2/3 actually made it out to at least one. Thank you to all participants. The Dane County unit burned a total of 248 acres spread over 13 sites. The Sauk unit burned a total of 197 acres spread over 15 sites (19 ownerships), and had 398 hours put in by 38 volunteers.

Chapter Aids Verona Area High School Prairie Restoration. The Empire-Sauk Chapter continues to help the Verona students and teachers revitalize and expand a 25-year school prairie planting that was definitely in need of some attention. We helped with a burn and donated an estimated \$1,000 worth of seed this past spring.

NORTHWEST ILLINOIS CHAPTER

The NIPES, through The Driftless Area Partnership, (part of the Illinois Department of Natural Resources' Conservation 2000 Ecosystems Program) has received funding for the following projects.

Ecological Survey. During 1998, we conducted a landscape scale survey of a 24 mile stretch of the Apple River in JoDaviess County, to identify natural communities of high and mid-quality, and to locate populations of state listed plants and animals. We determined an ecologically and logistically defensible boundary for the Apple River Canyon Natural Area, and prepared maps and supporting materials to assist local landowners to better manage the natural resources of the area. During the study, 129 natural areas were identified.

Total C2000 Funds received: \$19,370

Hill Prairie Renovation. During 1998, invasive woody plants were removed from

approximately 20 acres of hill prairie located within JoDaviess County, Illinois. Landowners identified in the 1993 IDNR sponsored JoDaviess County Prairie Survey were contacted and asked to participate. Sites were renovated on a first come basis as time and resources permitted. The work was done by paid, skilled laborers and supervised by a volunteer ecologist. The work consisted of cutting the plants and, as necessary, treating the stumps and/or removing the cuttings to a burn area.

Total C2000 Funds received: \$8,750

Mobile Prairie Management Unit. We have received the go-ahead to purchase equipment for the long-term management of our prairie remnants and restorations. We are now compiling a 'shopping list' with some of the following items: Transport Equipment (ATV or tractor, Equipment Trailer) Planting Equipment (Sprayer Boom, Harrow, Broadcast Seeder, Cultipacker) Harvesting Equipment (Pull-type Combine, Hand-held Seed Pickers) Processing Equipment (Hammermill, Fanning Mill) Prescribed Burn Equipment (Mower, Sprayer, Water Tank).

Total C2000 Funds received: \$ 27,600

Regional Planning Grant. A strategic planning session for the Driftless Area Partnership will be held to create strategies and action plans for northwest Illinois. The one-day intensive planning session will include all the major stakeholders. The Partnership has hired a professional facilitator (Hall Healy) and a professional writer (Elizabeth Mitchell) to conduct the meeting and publish the planning document.

Total C2000 Funds received: \$ 16,535

New Projects currently being considered for funding:

Ecological Survey. The primary objective is to complete an inventory of natural resources in the Galena River watershed, including high and mid-quality natural areas, populations of endangered or threatened species of vascular plants and vertebrate animals, and high quality habitat for reptiles and amphibians. A secondary objective is to identify areas suitable for natural resource protection and/or restoration. The end-product will be a published report describing the surveyed territory and its natural resources, including detailed maps indicating the location of all significant resources, and a set of protection/restoration recommendations. Estimated Total Project Cost.....\$ 28,900.

Conservation Easement. The purpose of this project is to protect the substantial ecological resources of Hanover Bluffs and to create a buffer for the adjacent Hanover Bluffs Nature Preserve. The land to be protected contains several special habitats and many listed species of plants and animals. It is adjacent to Hanover Bluffs Nature Preserve (at the bluff top) and to Primm's Pond (on the Mississippi River sand plain). Residential development is currently proceeding in the area and on the boundaries of the very lands to be protected.

This project would continue the landowners' support for Hanover Bluffs Nature Preserve to which they have already donated over 100 acres. The development rights for three tracts on Hanover Bluffs would be transferred from the landowners to The Prairie Enthusiasts. All three conservation easements would be perpetual and would disallow activities detrimental to the natural geology and ecology of the site. The total area to be protected is 264.75 acres.

An endowment fund and a management agreement would be established by the landowners with the Prairie Enthusiasts to help administer the easements.

Estimated Total Project Cost.....\$ 660,112.

SOUTHWEST WI CHAPTER

Southwest Chapter Winter Work Parties

Vale Prairie. This Green County remnant was purchased in 1992 and the 12 ½ acre buffer zone surrounding the 3 ½ acre remnant is being gradually returned to prairie. We have scheduled three work parties to remove the woody vegetation and weeds, and collect seed. If in doubt about weather or site conditions, call Gary Eldred at 608-375-5271.

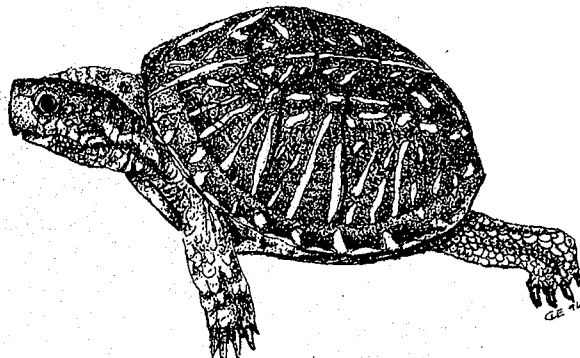
Directions: From Hwy 69, turn east onto Hwy 39. At Purinton Rd turn east. Proceed to Schneeberger Rd and turn north 0.2 miles, take the farm lane west (trees are on south side of lane, and crop land is on north side).

Heather's Prairie. Heather's Prairie is a 15 to 20 acre prairie pasture in Grant County. The Southwest Chapter has a management agreement with the owners and has intensified its efforts to

restore the site in recent years. Three work parties are scheduled to remove woody vegetation and weeds. If in doubt about site or weather conditions, call Gary Adams at 608-624-5797.

Directions: from Fennimore, take Hwy 18 west to Pine Rd. Turn left (east) on Graham Rd., then right (south) on Mt. Ridge Rd. to fire number 12109.

Thomas Wet Prairie. This 13.66 acre remnant was TPE's first purchase. In 1988 we paid a mere \$4,700 for this wet prairie, one of the rarest of prairie communities. One work party is scheduled for brush cutting on this site. This remnant is located along Grant County Hwy G, 7.5 miles south of Muscoda, and 8 miles north of Hwy 18 (Hwy G intersects Hwy 18 2.0 miles west of Montfort. If in doubt about site or weather conditions, call Don Hagar at 608-647-6628.

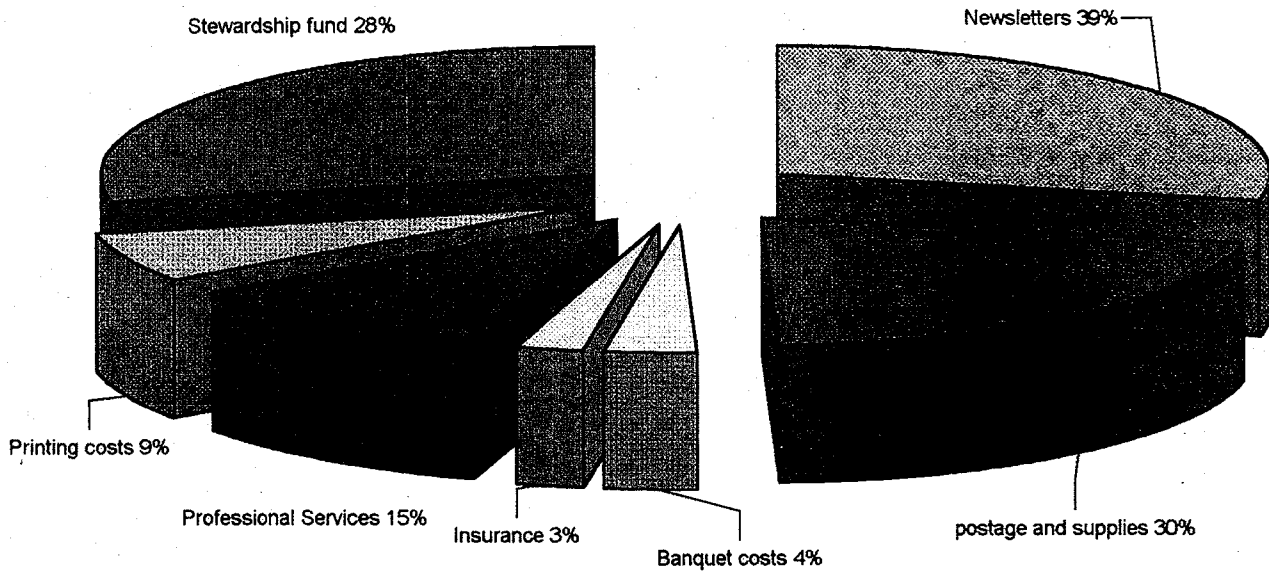
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
